MAIN STREET OVERVIEW

The Main Street Approach is centered around Transformation Strategies. A Transformation Strategy articulates a focused, deliberate path to revitalizing or strengthening a downtown or commercial district's economy. A program's work on Transformation Strategies should be organized around the Four Points: Economic Vitality, Design, Promotion, and Organization. A revitalization program's work – and its Transformation Strategies – need to be informed by a solid understanding of local and regional market data, and sustained and inclusive community engagement.

GREENSBORO'S TRANSFORMATION STRATEGIES

- Extend historic Downtown toward Mill Village to incorporate new development, both residential and commercial, and preserve the history of Greensboro.
- Improve the East/West Broad Street Corridor while maintaining the historic downtown.
- Maintain Historic Downtown while extending the downtown footprint.







DESIGN

The way that downtown **looks** is a crucial part of the Greensboro's downtown development formula for success. The **built environment** creates a positive atmosphere for investment, tourism, and small business.

LOCAL HISTORY AUDIO TOURS

Greensboro's audio tours continue to be well received by locals and visitors alike! Seven audio stations are installed around town and four additional audio stations are in production for downtown. The audio tour boxes are funded in part through the Certified Local Government grant program offered through the Georgia State Historic Preservation Office. Marketing materials sharing information about the tour box locations were produced and are distributed by local businesses.



DOWNTOWN TREESCAPE

Historic trees play a vital role in the aesthetics of downtown's footprint. These trees give shade and beautiful canopies to the sidewalks and historic buildings. In 2022, New Urban Forestry preformed tree maintenance on trees on North & South Main Street and Broad Street. They also worked to create a plan to fertilize and help give longevity to the existing trees in the historic downtown area.






STREETSCAPE IMPROVEMENTS


The City of Greensboro is funding Streetscape improvements through the Georgia Department of Transportation's Transportation Alternatives Program (TAP). Greensboro was one of the first cities in Georgia with a population under 5,000 to utilize this program.

Streetscape Phase IV received \$325,600 of additional TAP funding for continued Preliminary Engineering work as well as Right of Way acquisition in the 2022 funding cycle for TAP. Phase IV of Streetscape will take place along East and West Broad Streets and West Street.

Streetscape Phase V was awarded \$280,000 for Preliminary Engineering and Preconstruction activities through a second call for project applications in the 2022 funding cycle. Phase V of Streetscape will take place along Court and East Streets.



Greensboro's Streetscape improvements are part of a longstanding commitment by the city to increase pedestrian safety, improve parking, and make the downtown area more esthetically pleasing for residents and visitors. Streetscape plans include lighting, landscaping, and sidewalk improvements aimed at improving traffic and walkability while keeping in mind the sense of place and local history that is unique to downtown Greensboro's built environment.





HOLIDAY LIGHTING

There is no better time for Greensboro to look its best than at Christmas! Visiting downtown Greensboro during the holiday season is a favorite for area residents and guests.

The successful over-the-street café lighting continues to create excitement and interest in downtown. The lights are tremendously popular and increase pedestrian traffic and shoppers during the Christmas season.

New to the lighting contract were café lights in "Rick's Park" plaza area located on East Broad Street. These lights strung between the trees and around the trees.

In addition, special holiday banners were produced and hung from the light standards throughout downtown.

Because of the success of the over-street-lighting, these lights remain each year for visitors and residents to enjoy until the beginning of daylight savings time in the spring.



DOWNTOWN DESIGN ASSISTANCE MAIN STREET STUDIOS

The Greensboro Downtown Development Authority offers design assistance for property or business owners who are considering exterior changes to buildings in the historic downtown.



This service was previously offered by the Georgia Department of Community Affairs and was suspended in 2021. Because the input from professional designers has been critical for Greensboro's property owners in selecting paint colors, choosing awnings, and making other design decisions, the service was continued through an arrangement with Main Street Studios, a private design firm.

In 2022, properties located at 106 North Main Street, 111

North Main Street, 118 North Main Street, 120 North Main Street, 122 North Main Street, and 117 South Main Street utilized the downtown design assistance program. This resulted in **six** improved building facades located in the historic downtown.



ORGANIZATION

The organization of a successful community and downtown development program is a key component. Greensboro's program works to ensure that **strategic partnerships** on a local, regional, and state level are in place. Staff is **well-trained** and maintain important certifications. And **key data** about downtown are tracked to measure progress and set future goals.

MAIN STREET PROGRAM ASSESSMENTS

- Greensboro's 2022 Program Assessment was completed and approved by the Georgia Department of Community Affairs, Office of Downtown Development.
- Greensboro is a certified National Trust Main Street City for the year 2022.
- Greensboro is recognized as a Georgia Exceptional Main Street (GEMS) city for 2022. This is the highest designation achievable for a Main Street program within the state of Georgia.





GEORGIA DOWNTOWN ASSOCIATION

The Georgia Downtown Association (GDA) is a non-profit association that promotes the economic redevelopment of Georgia's traditional downtowns. Through advocacy, education and marketing, GDA works to focus the public's attention on the value of downtown. GDA is an independent association that supports both public and private sector efforts targeted at enhancing Georgia's downtown's. In 2022, Kendrick Ward was appointed to the board of directors on a three year term and serves on the GMA Legislative Policy committee and the GDA Education Committee.

GEORGIA INITIATIVE FOR COMMUNITY HOUSING (GICH) CERTIFICATION

The city of Greensboro applied for and was granted continued certification of its GICH program. Through GICH, the city is working to build partnerships with community organizations to improve housing in Greensboro. Greensboro's certification extends through 2024.

GA DEPARTMENT OF TRANSPORTATION LOCAL ADMINISTERED PROJECT (LAP) CERTIFICATION

Greensboro staff members underwent specialized training from the Georgia Department of Transportation (GDOT) in order to be certified to manage the city's upcoming Transportation Alternatives Program (TAP) grants for Streetscape improvements. The LAP Certification is a series of five courses including Plan Development Process, Local Area Programs, Right of Way Acquisition, Procurement, and Title VI trainings. Once Greensboro staff were trained in each of these areas, the city was LAP certified by GDOT.

City staff attend the necessary training and recertifications to maintain Greensboro's designation as a LAP Certified City. This certification gives Greensboro the ability to maintain design control over the upcoming Streetscape improvements along the state routes Hwy 278/15.



COMMUNITY PARTNERSHIPS

The office of downtown development maintains a close working relationship with multiple organizations within the Greene County community. These organizations are the Greensboro Business Association (GBA), the Greensboro Tree Board, Visit Lake Oconee CVB, Traditions Highway 15, Classic South, Greene County Family Connections and the Greene County Chamber of Commerce. Regular communication and strategic partnerships with these organizations help keep downtown Greensboro thriving.

GREENSBORO CITY STAFF & VOLUNEERS

Greensboro's Main Street office could not function without the help of some key community entities. Events and projects could not be accomplished without the help of the Street Department and Water/Sewer Department. Sam Price with the street department helps prep all events, keeps the hanging baskets beautiful, and assists whenever our office needs. The Water/Sewer department show up whenever they are needed. If there is a solar box that needs to be installed, large equipment that needs to be moved, or a helping hand at our events, they are ready to serve and assist as needed.

The Main Street office also could not function without the assistance of students from Greene County High School. Students from the CTAE and DECA classes assist at every event and help with community clean up days around town.



TRADITIONS HIGHWAY 15

Seven years ago, the Greensboro Main Street office joined Traditions Highway 15 marketing co-op and economic development group. The group meets monthly to discuss marketing plans to get people on the scenic route, GA DOT projects along highway 15 and economic development projects, such as cell towers in extremely rural areas.

In 2019, signs were installed at all county lines that are a part of the trail.

Currently, the team is working toward producing it's second travel magazine and is actively recruiting more communities to join the trail from mountains to ocean. 2022, a new app was developed by UGA students to promote the trail

PARTNERSHIP WITH HABITAT FOR HUMANITY

Greensboro is working closely to help HFH achieve its mission of increasing the availability of affordable housing in our area. The City is an active partner in HFH's Baynes Creek project. Greensboro prepared and submitted an extensive pre-application for the Georgia Department of Community Affairs (DCA)'s Community Development Block Grant (CDBG) Innovative grant cycle.

This pre-application was well-received, and DCA extended an invitation to the city to submit a full application. Due to scheduling considerations, HFH has determined that this application will not be possible in the 2022 cycle as originally intended. Future opportunities for support of the Baynes Creek project are being explored.



STAFF AND ELECTED OFFICIAL TRAINING

- Mayor Corey Williams completed Main Street 101.
- Kendrick Ward served on the panel for John Maxwell's 5 Leadership Summit.
- Kendrick Ward serves on the Georgia Downtown Association Board and is a member of the Education and Legislative Policy committees.
- Kendrick Ward was certified by the Georgia Department of Transportation in Engineering and Design. Procurement Policy and Procedure. This certification is required for Greensboro's Local Area Project (LAP) certification.
- Cail Hammons was certified by the Georgia Department of Transportation in Right Of Way Management. This certification is required for Greensboro's Local Area Project (LAP) certification.
- Cail Hammons attended the Community Planning Institute (CPI) presented by the Georgia Department of Community Affairs.


HISTORIC PRESERVATION ORDINANCE UPDATE

Community Development worked with the City Attorney's office to update the Historic Preservation Sign Ordinance for the city of Greensboro. A change to the permitted use of changeable copy signs within the district allowed First Presbyterian Church to improve its signage and remain in compliance with historic district regulations.

GREENE COUNTY ECONOMIC DEVELOPMENT RETREAT

Cail Hammons presented on behalf of the City of Greensboro at the Greene County Economic Development Retreat that was held as part of the Greene County Board of Education's Strategic Planning efforts.

The retreat was facilitated by the University of Georgia's Carl Vinson Institute for Government and Information was shared about economic development efforts such as the heritage tourism audio tours, planned streetscape improvements, and the Rural Zone program.





DOWNTOWN DATA

The Greensboro Main Street program tracks several key data points for Downtown Greensboro.


This Downtown data is used to track the program's success over time and is one reason Greensboro is a Georgia Exceptional Main Street, recognized by DCA. Downtown data is also used for various grant applications.

DOWNTOWN EMPLOYMENT DATA

Having an accurate count of people who work in downtown Greensboro is an important piece of information for Greensboro's development team. This number is used to recruit new businesses to town and as evidence of downtown's role in the community as an important center of employment.

Currently, **469 jobs** are in downtown Greensboro.








VACANCY RATES OVER TIME

In order to fulfill the annual reporting required for the city's Opportunity Zone and Rural Zones, the Community Development Department tracks annual **vacancy data** for downtown Greensboro.

In 2022, we continue to see vacancy rates drop as downtown experiences increased interest in properties available for both rent and purchase.





PROMOTION

The Greensboro Main Street program actively **promotes** our downtown through a schedule of regular events; targeted, professional advertisements; tourism marketing partnerships, and a strategic social media presence. These efforts work together to increase the number of **customers** and **tourists** visiting downtown and ultimately add to **increased business** recruitment and retention.

GREENSBORO AUDIO TOUR AND WALKING TOUR BROCHURE

Seven solar-powered audio interpretive stations are placed at locations of historic significance around Downtown Greensboro. Visitors enjoy walking to these various locations in downtown and interacting with the interpretive station to hear audio that tells the story of Greensboro's local history.

The Main Street office created a flyer for guests to pick up at local stores that identifies the locations of the stations throughout town. Building on the success of these flyers, a brochure was produced that provided greater detail about Greensboro's local history.

The audio tours are a great example of heritage tourism product development as Greensboro seeks to foster sense of place through the promotion of local history.

WEBSITE REFRESH

Greensboro Main Street program Updated the tourism website, <u>DowntownGreensboroGA.com</u>. The website switched platforms to be easier to navigate.






SOCIAL MEDIA PROMOTION

Greensboro's social media presence continues to grow, as both Facebook and Instagram saw an increase in "followers" for 2022.





AUGUSTA VISITOR CENTER

Greensboro was on display at Georgia Visitor Information Center on Interstate 20 near the Georgia/South Carolina state line in Augusta during the months of May through August 2022. The display promoted downtown Greensboro and encouraged tourists to visit Lake Oconee's Hometown while traveling west through the state.

Over the course of four months, the display was seen by estimated 143,726 visitors! This prime exposure comes at minimal costs for the Main Street program with maximum results. During the months that Greensboro is on display in the state welcome center, our downtown merchants report an increase in visitors traveling into the state from South Carolina and the Augusta area.

The Augusta VIC staff greets thousands of tourists as they enter Georgia each year. For 2022, estimated 143,726 people saw the Greensboro display. Costs to produce the display are minimal for this large number of impressions. Staff averages a cost of \$.01 per impression return on




investment (ROI) for driving key tourism and marketing traffic to Greensboro.

The display included promotional items from Greensboro as well as eye-catching merchandize from various Greensboro businesses. The goal of the display was to catch the attention of westbound travelers entering the state to encourage them to visit Greensboro during their time in Georgia. During the months that Greensboro is on display at the VIC, downtown merchants often report customers who comment that they saw the display and decided to exit Interstate 20 in Greensboro because of what they saw!















DOWNTOWN EVENTS AND GUESTS

Greensboro Main Street program produced four quarterly events for 2022. The events were: The 22nd annual **Southland Jubilee** festival, **Pickin' on the Greene** summer concert, **Rock 'n Roll Cruise In** classic car show, and the **Lighting of the Tree** holiday celebration.




These four events are produced to attract tourism to Downtown Greensboro in hopes people will return time and time again.


In addition to these events, the Main Street office produced and assisted with two additional community events, the **Motown on Main** concert benefiting Greene County Family Connection and Greensboro's annual **Downtown Trick or Treat**.

Greensboro's office of Downtown Development also works to track total

events that happen in the commercial district. These events are open to the public and are either free of charge or may be ticketed events that take place at the Oconee Brewing Company, Festival Hall, or other merchant events throughout the year as an indicator of downtown activity. The total events for 2022 are 152 with nearly 29,000 people attending these events









SOUTHLAND JUBILEE

The 22th annual Southland Jubilee took place on April 16 in Downtown Greensboro. Arts and crafts vendors, classic cars, agricultural exhibits, and children's' activities filled the streets of downtown for Greensboro's favorite day of the year!

Southland Jubilee featured live performances from Southern Spice Dance, Mark the Magic Man, and Saltamacchio's Tang Soo Do Karate School.

Greensboro's agricultural heritage was highlighted with the Mobile Dairy Unit, offering milking demonstrations throughout the day.

Vendor and car show attendance were likely impacted by the rain that passed through Greensboro on the morning of the festival. Several registered vendors did not attend, and car show registration was a bit lower than normal due to the weather. In the end, the sun came out and Greensboro enjoyed another year of its premier springtime event!

Southland Jubilee is made possible through the continued support of our business community and sponsors.

PICKIN' ON THE GREENE

The Main Street Office produced Pickin' on Greene, Greensboro's Summer Concert, on June 17. Lawn chairs filled the Court House Lawn and Café Tables dotted Main Street as an enthusiastic crowd turned out to hear live music from *Wim Tapel and The Cannons* and *After School Special*, a 90's tribute band fill the summer night.

The Summer Concert attracted around 1,000 people including many local residents from Greensboro and the Lake Oconee region and visitors from around the state.













ROCK 'N ROLL CRUISE IN

This year the Cruise In was a big success!

The annual car show event was produced and promoted through a partnership with the local Georgia Classic Cruisers Car Club.

More than eighty-five classic cars were on display along Main Street. Many of the car owners travel to Greensboro each year to show their cars at this popular regional event.

Live music from John Dunn and the Jazz Men filled downtown and great vendors added to the excitement.





DOWNTOWN TRICK OR TREAT

The Downtown Trick or Treat continues to provide a safe way for Greensboro's families to participate in the tradition of Trick or Treat. This year's event was held on Thursday, October 27th from 5-7pm. The Main Street office partnered with the Greensboro Police Department and other community organizations to offer the event to our community.

An estimated 500 children attended the event which featured a Trunk or Treat took place in the parking lot of the former BB&T building. Children were served hamburgers from the Police Department, and other law enforcement agencies and community groups offered trick or



treat candy. Many families ventured throughout downtown to trick or treat with local merchants.



LIGHTING OF THE TREE HOLIDAY CELEBRATION

Greensboro's annual Lighting of the Tree was a great success this year on December 2. The crowds for this popular holiday event continue to grow, with record attendance at 2,000 people.

Santa's arrival to downtown Greensboro kicked off the festivities around 6 pm. Santa surprised the crowd as he directed the Lake Oconee Academy Band of Titans in the performance of several favorite holiday carols.

Performers from Southern Spice Dance

Academy took the stage and delighted everyone with a holiday dance performance. Later carols were sung by sister vocalists EverGreene.

During the middle of the event, Mayor Corey Williams led the crowd in the annual tradition of prayer with a countdown to light Greensboro's Christmas Tree. Right on schedule, the tree was lit with the crowd applauding in response!

Vendors offered gingerbread, hot cocoa, and candy canes as children and adults alike enjoyed the charm of a small-town Christmas! Visitors roasted marshmallows, snuck in a quick visit with Santa, and enjoyed fresh cooked food from local vendors.

Year after year, one of Greensboro's most loved traditions is the annual community-wide search for the perfect tree to stand on the Court House Lawn for the holiday season. This year's tree was more than twenty feet tall and was donated by an anonymous family.

Assistance cutting the tree, transporting it town, and placing the tree into position on the Court House Lawn was provided by New Urban Forestry.







ECONOMIC VITALITY

Economic Vitality focuses on capital, incentives, and other economic and financial tools to assist new and existing businesses, catalyze property development, and create a supportive environment for entrepreneurs and innovators that drive local economies



BUSINESS DEVELOPMENT

In 2022, Downtown saw the opening of four new businesses and the loss of two. Greensboro added The Burch Food Truck, Bonnies Coffee and More, Greene Co. Habitat Store, and Broad and Main Antiques. This added a total of **13 new jobs** to downtown. Greensboro also lost Greensboro Pharmacy and Royal Kings, which lost four jobs.

BUILDINGS SOLD IN 2022

In 2022, eleven commercial buildings were sold in downtown Greensboro. The sale prices for these buildings totaled **\$3,940,044**. The buildings addresses that were sold are; 202 East Broad Street, 404 West Broad Street, 1191 East Broad Street, 111 East Broad Street, Main Street N, 109 North Main Street, 116 North Main Street, 203 North Main Street, 111 North Main Street, 106 South Main Street, 106 North Main Street.

PUBLIC/PRIVATE INVESTMENT IN DOWNTOWN

Georgia Main Street tracks the total public/private investment in downtowns across the state through monthly reports submitted by each community. This total includes the sum of Expenses, Real Estate Sales, investment, Rehab Public investments. Infill investments, and Housing investments. In 2022, Greensboro saw an investment of \$4,154,044 in the This downtown commercial district. number represents a 52% increase over 2021.

LOW INTEREST LOAN FACILITATION

The Greensboro Downtown Development Authority stands ready to assist potential new business ventures in downtown through the facilitation of low interest loan applications.

The DDA received three inquiries about potential low interest loan applications and assisted with one application to the Georgia Cities Foundation Revolving Loan Fund.



RURAL ZONE PROMOTION

Greensboro's Rural Zone offers dollar for dollar tax credits against a qualifying business or property owner's Georgia Income Tax liability. The Rural Zone tax credits available are for iob creation, property investment, rehabilitation expenses that take place with the city of Greensboro's designated Rural Zone.

The Rural Zone program is managed by the Greensboro Office of Downtown Development. Greensboro markets the Rural Zone as an economic development incentive through a printed brochure, on the downtown website, <section-header><complex-block>

and through direct communication with eligible property or business owners.

In 2022, a direct mailing was sent to Rural Zone property and business owners informing these owners that they may be eligible for the Rural Zone tax credits. **Three properties** were certified to claim Rural Zone tax credits in 2022, resulting in a combined **\$188,875 in potential state tax relief** for these downtown investors over the next five years.



ENTERTAINMENT DISTRICT

A new downtown entertainment district was passed by the Greensboro City Council and took effect for in January 2022. The entertainment district allows for the consumption of open container alcohol within the district boundaries during city sponsored events.

Drinks may be malt beverages or wine and must be no larger than 16 ounces in size. All drinks are to be served in an official city logoed cup or container.

The entertainment district allows for patrons from the popular Oconee Brewing Company to carry a drink with them as they walk between the brewery and downtown events that are taking place along Main Street.

Greene Family dedicates tree for the late John Moses Greene Oak Tree Dedication for Deacon John Moses (Bobby) Greene

(Greensboro, Ga. --- July 26, 2022) Greene family dedicate a tree in honor of the late John Moses Greene, owner of Greene Logging.

John Moses Greene was born to the late Johnny and Eutha Greene on July 23, 1937, in Greensboro, Georgia and departed this life on July 16, 2021.

He served in the United States Army Reserves from June 1953 until August 1957 and separated at the rank of Corporal.

He was a Deacon in the Moore's Chapel Baptist Church in Greensboro, Georgia for many decades under various leaders. Further, he was a school bus operator in Greene County for over 26 years. He didn't play and the kids (including his own) knew he meant business! Any disorderly conduct may or sometimes did result in turning the bus around and going back to the School to report the issue.

He started Greene Logging in 1958 and steered it ethically, faithfully, and diligently for over 63 years, with whom both brothers (Buck and Meme) and sons were a part of the enterprise. He conducted logging business in Greene and surrounding counties in Georgia. He knew the business from start to finish, could name any tree, believed you should be able to compute figures in your head, and operated on the premise that if you treated people fairly, then you couldn't go wrong and right would follow you.

He was married to Gennie B. Greene on August 5, 1958, with whom five children were born: Johnny Lisa, Gail, Steve, and Mark. Three daughters were added to the family: Derome, Louise, and Vivien.

He loved to work, "coon" hunt (raccoon) was his first love, repair his own equipment when possible, and share his night dreams which he would then connect to current events (he believed all dreams had meaning), tease, joke, and imitate people for laughs, among other things. One of his favorite songs was "What a Time."



We are pleased that this loving and remarkable effort, led by his oldest Grand-daughter, Titinya T. Greene-Ingram (whom he referred to as "*Cutt'in Fuzz*"), with allegiance and support from other grandchildren (Jermel Wynn, Rashad Coleman, and Johnny Greene, Jr., and who serve on the Board), demonstrates their commitment to honoring their Grandfather. The Oak Tree was chosen because it symbolizes honor, nobility, and wisdom. It also provides food, shelter, and shade for all kinds of wildlife, even that which he loved to hunt. Like the Oak Tree, he had many attributes, including a multitude of patterns that traveled up, down, and around the tree, revealing both smooth and rough spots, and all which come with living.

We hope you will love visiting his tree and enjoying its shade, in all of its glory and imperfections.

Plans Underway for Next Phase of Streetscape Improvements City Receives GDOT Funding for Sidewalks

(December 15, 2022 – Greensboro, GA) The City of Greensboro is working to bring Streetscape Improvements along a state route through downtown. This next phase of Streetscape improvements is funded in part by a Georgia Department of Transportation Alternatives (TAP) grant and will provide for design work and preliminary engineering.

The proposed project will design future improvements mostly located along Broad Street in downtown.

"Greensboro's sidewalks are really one of the hallmarks of our downtown," explains community development director, Cail Hammons. "The hexagonal pavers and light fixtures are historically appropriate for our community, and we are thrilled to be able extend our Streetscape along the state route."

Initial work on the project will include survey crews who will be taking measurements, photos and possibly soil samples within the project area. These crews are scheduled to be on-site for the next few weeks. The information collected will be used as designers begin drafting the plans.

"At this time, funding is only available for the pre-construction activities," explains Hammons. "Our hope is that once this phase of the project is completed, the city will be able to leverage additional grant funding for construction."



Greensboro began its streetscape improvement efforts in the late 1990s. The most recent improvements was a grant-funded project to improve pedestrian facilities and lighting along Greene Street in downtown Greensboro.
